- The Appalachian Community Grant Program: Buckeye Hills held a series of meetings over the past month and have engaged with more than 400 stakeholders form local governments, partners, nonprofits, and businesses. Buckeye Hills will be submitting three broad planning grant applications under the following areas: Ohio River Corridor; Muskingum Corridor; Greater Buckeye Hills Region

STATEMENT OF ACTIVITIES

YEAR TO DATE ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSE DETAIL

Administrative Expenses for Fiscal Year 2023 totaled \$2,955,021.08 at December 31. This total represents 47.11% of the Council's administrative budget utilized. Total spending for this time period is budgeted to be 50%. Adjustments to specific line items are listed on the Quarterly Budget Review for consideration and approval. The cumulative Indirect Cost rate for this period is 46%. Projected Indirect Costs for Fiscal Year 2023 are 50.69%.

AGING AND DISABILITY PROGRAMS SERVICES & FUNDING REPORT

The Aging and Disability Division worked with various service providers and helped administer a multitude of direct service programs to eligible residents of our eight-county region. Between July 1 and December 31, nearly \$5 million in direct service dollars were utilized to provide the units of service listed in the report. BHRC continues to support our provider network to evaluate the needs of the communities and serve area seniors in the best way possible.



CURRENT INITIATIVE/ NEWS

House Bill 45 Aging Highlights:

- \$350 million for nursing homes to provide lump sum payments to nursing facilities for workforce relief payments.
- Implements the Direct Support Professional Quarterly Retention Payments Program Makes a Fiscal Year 2023 supplemental appropriation of \$45 million in County Board Waiver Match and \$105 million in the Medicaid Services line item to be used for the Direct Support Professional Quarterly Retention Payments Program
- \$50 million for PACE expansion to Franklin, Hamilton, Montgomery, Lorain, Lucas, and Summit counties
- \$40 million for provider relief through direct care staff compensation at assisted living facilities.
- \$30 million for provider relief for hospice care workforce
- \$10 million for provider relief for home and community-based services to address the workforce shortage
- \$8 million in grant funding to support adult day centers
- change to revise the method to assess the value of affordable housing developments would increase property tax liability for senior and workforce housing developments.
- barring projects to rehabilitate federal low-income housing tax credit properties from qualifying for Ohio Historic Preservation Tax Credits
- \$161 million in emergency rental assistance under the Department of Development (for 2021 arrearages)
- \$90 million for crisis care infrastructure expansion, with funding to be allocated regionally based on regional psychiatric hospital catchment areas.
- \$85 million in ARPA HCBS funding to grow behavioral health disciplines at state colleges and universities and other initiatives to recruit and re-train those workers.
- \$25 million for the state's foodbanks
- \$30 million to County Jobs and Family Services departments to conduct eligibility redeterminations of all Medicaid recipients in the state
- Fills the state's Budget Stabilization Fund to 8.5% of GRF Revenue received in 2022 (this would make the fund balance roughly \$3.4 billion).

Home and Community Based Services (HCBS) language: *The foregoing appropriation item 042633, HCBS* Workforce Support, shall be used to fund provider relief allocations for Medicaid home and community-based *services providers. These funds shall be used exclusively for direct care staff compensation, which may include staff retention bonus payments, overtime pay and shift differential payments, staff recruitment costs, and new hire incentive payments. No funds under this section shall be paid to any of the following:*

- (A) Contract workers;
- (B) Staff supplied by or through a staffing agency;
- (C) Program administrators;
- (D) Executive staff;
- (E) Owners.

Ohio Department of Aging Budget Submission Highlights:

- Options for Healthy Independent Ohioans (OHIO) Fund
 - Matching grants for local government and nonprofit funding to keep at risk populations in homes and communities

- One response to this policy mismatch has been local initiatives, typically funded at the county level through property taxes that raise funds for home care services and supports for individuals in the local community or through private foundations. This program will target at-risk individuals before they are in crisis and become reliant on the Medicaid program.
- The OHIO Fund will prioritize counties with no senior service tax levy or low senior service tax levies per capita.
- These grants will provide supports and services which align with the State Plan on Aging, including, but not limited to, home modifications, personal or respite care, adult day services, and transportation. This is a new line item that will provide funds for a competitive matching grant program for localities to support older Ohioans who want to stay in their homes as they age but who are at risk of not being able to make that choice because of critical gaps in their resources and support. Grants would provide supports such as home delivered meals, personal care, respite care, adult day care, emergency response systems, transportation, and minor home repair.
- Eligible local entities could include community-based organizations, non-profits and area agencies on aging.
- Of the request, \$1.25m will be spent at the state level, including funding for 2 positions and personal services contracts for a statewide nutritional assessments, a media campaign for family caretakers, the expansion of GetSetUp to include additional classes, expansion of mental health first aid and funding for mental health training for aging service providers
- Fifteen million dollars the first year and \$25M the second year of the biennium will be used to provide grants to the local entities. It is anticipated that the funding will be granted to the local entities. It is still to be determined what the cash flow may be.

• Increase the Alzheimer's and Other Dementia Respite Line

- This increase will make it possible to continue delivering services to communities, hire a statewide caregiving and dementia coordinator, and sustain the newly established caregiver center of excellence.
- Returning state investment to \$4.3 million as Ohio's aging population continues to increase, as well as those living with Alzheimer's Disease or other forms of dementia. An increase in this ALI will support expansion of service delivery to targeted Ohioans (persons living with Alzheimer's Disease and dementias and their family caregivers) as well as support state-level initiatives to expand training and education of family caregivers and health care professionals. The state will retain 10 percent of the funds for state-level administration, including supporting Ohio's Alzheimer's Disease and Dementia Statewide Resource Center, as well as compliance to Ohio Revised Code 173.04.

• Increase the Use of Participant Directed Service

Most aging individuals prefer to remain in their homes. Participant Directed Services is a component
of the PASSPORT program, which authorizes the enrollee to hire their caregiver. Often, the caregiver
has a pre-existing relationship with program participants. As part of our request to enhance this
service, <u>Participant Direction Liaisons</u> will be located at each AAA to assist individuals to find and
guide their proposed Participant Directed Provider through the provider process and support
individuals in their new "employer" role. Supporting Participant Direction is one avenue to
addressing the workforce shortage, while supporting participant choice.

• Engage in Strategic Rate Modifications

 We recognize that strategic rate modifications are an important piece of the budgeting conversation in the aging space, in particular the PASSPORT, Assisted Living Waiver, and PACE programs we operate.

Enhance Talent Attraction and Retention

- Specifically, we seek to focus on the future pipeline of workers
- Options such as boomerang reverse scholarships for students returning to work, live, and volunteer in an aging-related field.

• Leveraging HCBS ARPA Funds

- In partnership with Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Services, ODM seeks to implement the Governor's Behavioral Healthcare Workforce proposal to remove financial barriers from obtaining licenses, certifications, and exams necessary for employment in community behavioral health fields. By leveraging one-time ARPA funding this targeted effort will help attract and retain more qualified professionals into behavioral health care workplaces throughout the state.
- To date, ARPA HCBS funds have only been spent as authorized by the Legislature for provider relief. This submission includes appropriation to support the ARPA spending plan, as approved by CMS. There are strict rules around any ARPA HCBS funded projects. These funds must be spent by March 2025.

• <u>Provider Rate Increases</u>

Approximately 170,000 providers across Ohio serve individuals on Medicaid. ODM leadership has
met with providers across the spectrum and heard with resounding clarity that most providers are
facing significant inflationary and workforce challenges. However, as instructed by OBM, ODM has
submitted a budget request which projects costs using current Medicaid rates. This will allow time
for the administration to evaluate the overall financial outlook for the state budget and the ability to
support a sustainable, aligned level of rate changes across the Medicaid agencies and various types
of providers. ODM will continue the discussions regarding Medicaid rates and address the issues to
the full extent that resources can support it in the FY24-25 operating budget.

CURRENT INITIATIVES

HEAP Outreach | Winter/Regular Program outreach is occurring with weekly social media posts. Billboards are up in all eight counties and will continue through March promoting the program and directing consumers to their local Community Action Agencies.

Aging Outreach | Buckeye Hills participated in 45 outreach events throughout 2022. Planning is underway to fill up the Outreach calendar for 2023. If there is an upcoming outreach event in your community we should attend or a civic group that would like to have a speaker on Aging topics, please contact Amanda Reeder at <u>areeder@buckeyehills.org</u>.

Medicare Outreach | General Medicare posts and information on Extra Help, Medicare Savings Programs, and Preventative Services run on a weekly basis across our social media channels. Medicare Open Enrollment advertisements have concluded. We had advertisements scheduled across seven radio stations reaching all eight counties. Newspaper advertisements running in Monroe, Morgan, Perry, and Meigs county papers. A WOUB commercial aired 148 times encouraging individuals to call the OSHIIP hotline for assistance with enrollment.

Vaccine Outreach | With the recent extension of the ODA Vaccine Support Grant, the Communications team has worked with local radio stations across the region to schedule a combination ad encouraging community members to receive both their flu shot and COVID vaccine. A total of over 1,800 spots will air from the end of November through the middle of February. Stations include Results Radio, WMOA, WATH, WYVK/WBYG/WTHQ, and WYBZ.

Annual Report & LDD Report | The Communications team is compiling the 2022 annual report, which will be presented at the April 7 meeting of the BHRC General Policy Council. The LDD Return on Investment Report is underway and will be presented to our federal legislators and agency staff at the NADO DC conference in March.

Open Meetings and Open Records Procedures | The Communications Director is working with the BHRC leadership team to review and update our Open Meetings and Open Records procedures to ensure our continued transparency and compliance with Ohio's Open Meetings Act and Ohio Public Records Act.

Website Usability Questionnaire | The Communications Team is reviewing the usability and features of our website, buckeyehills.org, which saw its last significant update in January 2019. Please watch your email for a website usability questionnaire in February. We will also share the link in our weekly Member & Partner Update. Your responses will help shape the functionality of our website, the information it contains, and ensure that it continues to be a useful resource for the communities we serve.

FCC Broadband Map Video | The Communications Director worked with BHRC Broadband Coordinator Ryan Collins to provide a brief video outlining the process to look up one's home or business address to verify the accuracy of the FCC's National Broadband Map and, if necessary, challenge the information. Arts & Economic Prosperity 6 Study | In addition to survey collection by BHRC staff, collection of the survey by our area venues has increased. We continue to raise awareness of the survey in our community and have established venues who are fully involved in the process of distributing and collecting both paper and online surveys. Our goal is to increase the number of venues that feel comfortable using their own staff and volunteers to collect the survey as it will only widen the scope of data we are trying to capture in our region. We are utilizing the help of the Ohio Arts Council's marketing team to help spread the message of what we're trying to do with the survey. Finally, we are putting as many dates as possible on our calendar that BHRC staff are able to attend. These are events where the venue's staff and volunteers are limited.

 - Governor DeWine's State of the State Address Recap | On Tuesday, Governor DeWine delivered his State of the State address, laying out what will be in his Executive Budget. He focused on mental health, support for children and mothers, economic development, education, healthcare, public safety, and the environment. Here are some highlights:
 - Economic development, housing, and workforce policies
 - Creation of a new All Ohio Future fund with a one-time investment of \$2.5 billion to prepare necessary infrastructure for large economic development sites all across Ohio
 - \$150 million to create new innovation hubs throughout Ohio
 - Creation of a state low-income housing tax credit and single-family housing tax credits to stimulate the construction of more housing
 - \$3 million one-time funding for capital improvements & equipment for career tech programs
 - Provide need-based financial aid for university regional campuses and community colleges by increasing the amount of the Ohio College Opportunity Grant to \$6k per student per year and providing a \$5k scholarship for students in the top 5% of their high school class if they attend college in Ohio
 - H2Ohio/Environment
 - Creation of the H2Ohio Rivers Initiative to improve and protect the health and quality of rivers (dams, river restoration, and habitat work)
 - Local Government
 - Full funding of next-generation 911 systems
 - Full funding of MARCS fees
 - Aging:
 - Nothing specific for PASSPORT or Ohio Home Care waivers either on rates or operations. Nothing mentioned about MyCare or duals. There is no specific line item for these programs so it's unclear what the fiscal impact is at this point.

- Increase in senior community services: ALI GRF 490411. The 2024 amount requested is \$12,832,194; 2025 amount is \$12,832,323 (the previous budget appropriations were \$9,798,995 and \$9,737,042). The senior farmers market expansion is typically taken out of this amount but based on the original Ohio Department of Aging budget request there may be more funding for services through area agencies on aging as well.
- ODA will give briefings next week about the budget for all stakeholders.

The Governor also announced the creation of a new cabinet-level agency called the Department of Children and Youth, focused on addressing the physical and behavioral health of kids and mothers, early identification of mental health illnesses, support for fostering, and support for early childhood education. He also announced a new State of Ohio Action for Resiliency Network (SOARN) – a comprehensive multi-year research study to help launch new discoveries about brain and resiliency with respect to mental health and identify which interventions work best for various communities and individuals.

Other investments included full funding of school resource officers, support for the Fair School Funding plan, expanded Ed Choice scholarships, nursing home quality, police training in de-escalation and mental health crisis intervention, child tax deductions, children's service system funding increase, and more.

The full speech can be **viewed on the OhioChannel.org**. Formal legislative language will be introduced soon, with the Ohio House Finance Committee likely to begin hearings as soon as next week. The state operating budget must pass and be signed into law before midnight on June 30.

CURRENT INITIATIVES

- The Ridges | On January 19, 2023, the partnership formed under the direction of Misty Crosby—between the Buckeye Hills Foundation and Community Building Partners LLC, known as the Ridges Development Partners LLC— presented to the Ohio University Board of Trustees a Development Plan for The Ridges. The Board of Directors passed a Resolution to proceed with the Development Strategy during that meeting. The project began with BHRC and Community Building Partners LLC working under an ARC Grant to conduct assessments of the land and structures, and create a development proposal to redevelop the property. Throughout the development, the process will utilize many different economic development tools across several components including various types of housing, owner occupied business integration, work-live spaces, and other retail, commercial and educational spaces. The real value throughout the BHRC Region will be benchmarking the processes and measuring success. Moving forward, several programs and private investment strategies will be used to revitalize the property and create a "playbook" for communities throughout the region to implement similar programs and strategies in their jurisdictions.
- Appalachian Community Grant Program | On December 8, BHRC Development Staff submitted a Technical Assistance Grant Application with support from communities and organizations across our eight-county region. The application encompasses planning projects we discussed in recent stakeholder meetings for the Muskingum River Corridor, Ohio River Corridor, and the Greater Buckeye Hills Region. BHRC is grateful for the support shown for this regional effort, and we are excited to help you move your projects forward. The application received 170 letters of support from participating local governments and organizations, and many more have expressed interest in working alongside BHRC in this planning effort to help develop competitive applications for Round 2 of the ACGP in 2023. Ohio Department of Development and the Governor's Office of Appalachia have stated that grant awards will be announced in early 2023. Grant awards will need to go before the State Controlling Board to approve the release of funds.
